#### **Extracts from Act**

- **40.**—(1) A person aggrieved by a decision of the Minister on an application for an aquaculture licence or by the revocation or amendment of an aquaculture licence may, before the expiration of a period of one month beginning on the date of publication in accordance with this Act of that decision, or the notification to the person of the revocation or amendment, appeal to the Board against the decision, revocation or amendment, by serving on the Board a notice of appeal.
- (2) A notice of appeal shall be served-
- (a) by sending it by registered post to the Board,
- (b) by leaving it at the office of the Board, during normal office hours, with a person who is apparently an employee of the Board, or
- (c) by such other means as may be prescribed.
- (3) The Board shall not consider an appeal notice of which is received by it later than the expiration of the period referred to in subsection (1)
- 41.—(1) For an appeal under section 40 to be valid, the notice of appeal shall—
- (a) be in writing,
- (b) state the name and address of the appellant,
- (c) state the subject matter of the appeal,
- (d) state the appellant's particular interest in the outcome of the appeal,
- (e) state in full the grounds of the appeal and the reasons, considerations and arguments on which they are based, and
- (f) be accompanied by such fee, if any, as may be payable in respect of such an appeal in accordance with regulations under section 63, and

Site Ref.: T06/439A - Pacific Oysters - Bags and trestles

The Marine Institute state that site 766/492A is located within the Cromane designated Shellfish Growing Waters Area but that site T6/439A is not. Both sites are within the designated Shellfish Area and both sites are situated adjacent to existing licenced areas.

The cultivation of oysters in bags and on trestles is the most productive way of growing oysters. This method is implemented all over the world and as the Marine Institute indicate these sites will have no chemical or hazardous substance and any impact on the environment will not be significant also as stated by the Marine Institute.

The positioning of site T6/439A is approximately five kilometres from any discharge point and it is significantly further than many of the sites situated within Castlemaine Harbour which are between one and three kilometres from the discharge point. Please note that oysters filter water all the time and play a significant part in the purification of water. They also contribute to the filtering of waste water which is discharged into the Castlemaine Harbour.

An Taisce indicate that they have reviewed 34 licence applications for aquaculture development in Castlemaine Harbour. They do not indicate if they have reviewed sites T6/439A or T6/482A. While I respect that Castlemaine Harbour is of major ecological importance and that we have a range of habitats which are very important to our future the granting of some additional licences in the harbour will not impact unduly on its habitats.

In respect of some of the concerns raised by residents and other fishermen in the area please note that sites T6/439A and T6482A are on the east side of Castlemaine Harbour. They pose no threat to human beings or to any wildlife species. These sites are not visible from the shore and it is not possible to reach these sites on foot but only by boat.

AS referred to earlier I commenced fishing with my father when I was twelve years old and continued to do so until I immigrated to America for some years. I applied for these licences two years ago as fishing is in my blood and is something I always wanted to do. There is a good and healthy living to be made from it but for this to happen I need these licences. Please note that opportunities for economic progression in the area are limited and obtaining a licence to fish in the harbour would both fulfil both my economic and social needs.
